Outcome	In the Dnipropetrovsk Oblast, which has been hosting a large number of IDPs in the midst of protracted warfare, the project will protect the lives and dignity of the affected people by providing support that meets the complex needs of the vulnerable population, especially for vulnerable families through ① cash transfers, ② protection through case management, and ③ psychosocial support.		
Business Overview	This project will provide support (Life saving) for the survival of vulnerable families among IDP, returnees and non-displaced persons in the eastern Dnipropetrovsk Oblast, which is one of the largest recipients of IDP in the country. Specifically, it protects the lives and dignity of war victims by providing a composite of ① cash benefits, ② protection through case management, and ③ psychosocial support, and reduces protection risks by providing finely tailored support to the needs of each victim.

## 1. Description of Businesses

### Component 1: Cash-assistance

Provides Cash for Protection to vulnerable household's in Dnipropetrovsk Oblast. In accordance with Ukrainian Cash Working Group (WG) standards, a UAH 3,600/ per person, per month will be paid in a lump sum for three months to up to 600 people. While cash is the best option, the Global Cash WG also recommends providing food and other supplies in kind according to the needs of the beneficiaries. Based on this, the Ukrainian Cash WG provides cash benefits if the local market is functioning and the beneficiaries wish to receive cash. If the local market is not functioning or the beneficiaries live in remote areas, or for other reasons, the Ukrainian Cash WG provides flexible support if the beneficiaries wish to receive cash benefits rather than cash benefits. Based on the functioning of the local market and the past experience of projects in Ukraine, it was judged that the beneficiaries had a high need for cash and decided to provide cash benefits.

### Component 2: Protection through Case Management

A case management team consisting of protection caseworkers, cash transfer officers and psychologists will identify high-risk individuals and provide case management to 500 people in Dnipropetrovsk Oblast, Ukraine. This project will provide mobile-team protection case management and social support to vulnerable, high-risk and need-specific individuals among IDP and non-displaced persons in Dnipropetrovsk Oblast.

Two teams will conduct protection case management for 500 selected beneficiaries. Protection case management shall comply with the work procedures adopted among the relevant agencies and shall be consistent with the guiding principles of case management, including "Do No Harm," "confidentiality", "non-discrimination", "the best interests of the child", "participation", "consent", "ethical standards", "accountability" and "person-centered approach". Emphasis should be placed on a process consisting of six steps: introduction and intake (interviews with beneficiaries), risk assessment, formulation of action plans, implementation of case management, follow-up and monitoring, and case closure or transition.

At present, many Ukrainian individuals in particular face protection issues such as inaccessibility to social services and violation of social rights due to damage or loss of ID and documents, such as certificates, due to the damage caused by war-related aggression or the need to evacuate urgently. In this project, as necessary, the organization will refer the beneficiaries to services within and outside the partner organizations, and support the reacquisition and restoration of necessary documents so that the beneficiaries can access necessary humanitarian assistance and social services, and subsidize the cost of such support as necessary.

In addition, provide mobility support by providing transportation means to support people with limited mobility and people with physical disabilities. Mobility assistance is provided only when access is secure and does not include movement to or across borders or evacuation.

### Component 3: Psychosocial support

Provide adult-and child-specific psychosocial support (PSS) by psychologists and trained facilitators in the Ukrainian Dnipropetrovsk Oblast. In addition to group sessions for adults (target of 450 people) and individual sessions (target of

150 people), group sessions for children (target of 600 people) will be held. Senior psychologists focus on complex individual cases that require specialized knowledge, while junior psychologists provide group and individual sessions for adults. Individual sessions for adults will be offered both online and offline. For children's sessions, member NGO staff train psychologists and facilitators from partner organizations, and the facilitators conduct sessions under the supervision of psychologists. Senior psychologists and junior psychologists will be employed, and five facilitators will be selected to conduct group sessions for children. Hired staff and facilitators will be trained by partner organization as necessary to implement the project. In addition, we will coordinate with the local government and Mental health and Psychosocial Support (MHPSS) Technical Working Group (TWG) to reconfirm PSS needs and coordination status, and map referral destinations such as mental health clinics to introduce beneficiaries who may need further professional support.
