1.1 Field team organization and orientation

The project is implemented through a remote management structure coordinated by the member NGO's international team based in Erbil and a local implementing partner operating in the Autonomous Administration of North and East Syria (AANES). The local partner is responsible for day-to-day field-level project management, including activity implementation, beneficiary engagement, and documentation. The Erbil-based international staff maintain daily communication with the local partner's focal point to oversee project quality, monitor progress against performance indicators, and provide technical guidance. At headquarters level, the member NGO is responsible for donor reporting, financial oversight, and payment processing. This structure ensures strong coordination, localized implementation, and accountability across all levels of the project.

1.2 Selection of beneficiaries

The project targets vulnerable youth aged 16 to 28 residing in Kisreh District, Deir ez-Zor Governorate, Syria, who are affected by severe poverty, unemployment, limited access to education, and psychological distress resulting from prolonged conflict. A total of 113 unique individuals have been selected as beneficiaries, with no duplication across output categories.

The selection is based on clear vulnerability criteria and is disaggregated as follows:

- Output 1: 40 females who have not completed primary education
- Output 2: 30 females who are unemployed or not in stable employment
- **Output 3**: 43 individuals (male and female) who possess basic vocational skills but lack stable income and have expressed willingness to start a business
- Output 4: Life skills training component targeting the 70 beneficiaries from Outputs 1 and 2

The project applies an inclusive targeting strategy, ensuring participation of individuals from the host community, internally displaced persons (IDPs), and returnees. Special prioritization is given to female or youth-headed households, persons with disabilities, and survivors of gender-based violence (GBV).

Beneficiaries were identified through a transparent application and selection process led by the implementing partner, using clearly defined eligibility criteria aligned with the project's objectives.
